

We came to Milan, Italy on the 2nd of June with 15 students (14 boys and 1 girl), accompanied by two teachers from the Irinyi János Reformed Educational Centre, Kazincbarcika, Hungary. Our travel was safe and fast, as the bus drivers knew the routes well, they changed themselves in every 3 hour, when we got off the bus to have a short break.

At the arrival, our students were a bit tired and then surprised how much litter was on the street as the weekly market which is hold in front of our hostel, was over.



We got into Ostello Linda and the receptionists gave us our keys, we separated the groups and showed them their rooms: a room for 10 boys, a room for 4, a room for the girl and 2 rooms for the two teachers. I can say the rooms were clean and satisfying. We gave the receptionist the security deposit



(20 Euros/person), and told our students to take some photos of their room to know in what condition they should leave the accommodation.



After packing out we were collected in the hall and we talked about the rules again (tidiness, no alcohol, no guests etc.) and we emphasised the importance of their daily report which they had to write after arriving from work, we had some food to eat together for dinner, and we went out to look around. They were all surprised that all the litter had been collected and taken out and almost nobody was on the streets on Saturday night.

## Eating together/ Közös étkezés

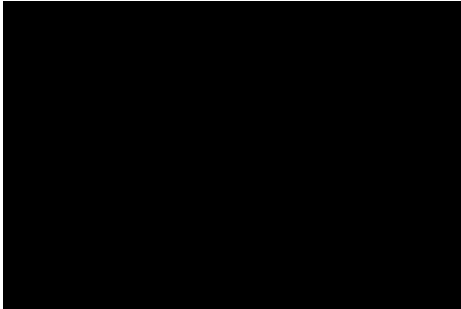

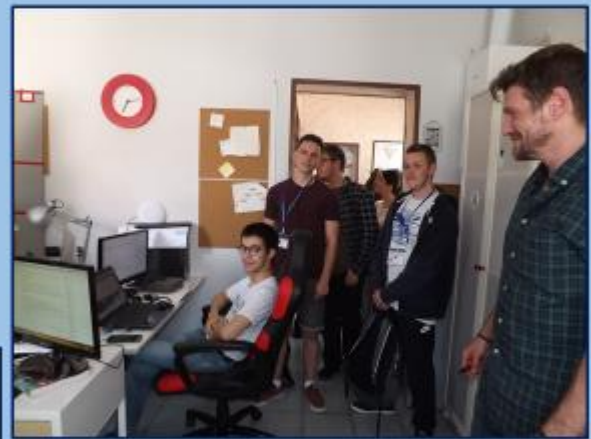

Every day we went to have a look at our groups' tasks and workplaces, as Gabriela Oldrini helped us to organise it with the tutors.



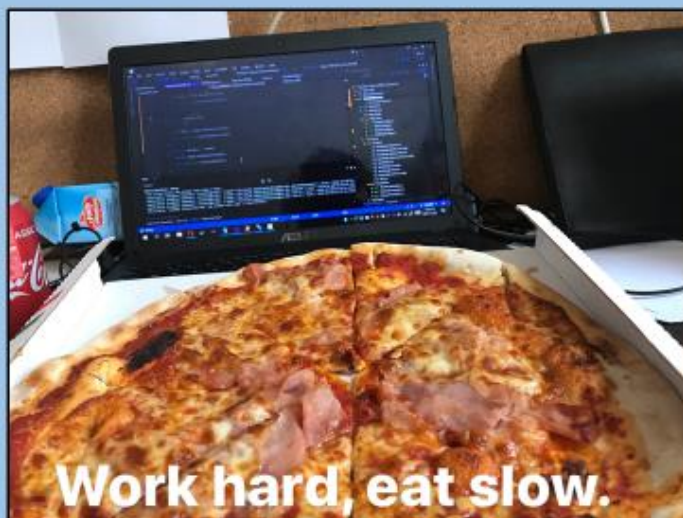

Our students tried to make an active participation and to have a good accomplishment of the tasks assigned by their tutors during the 13 workdays. 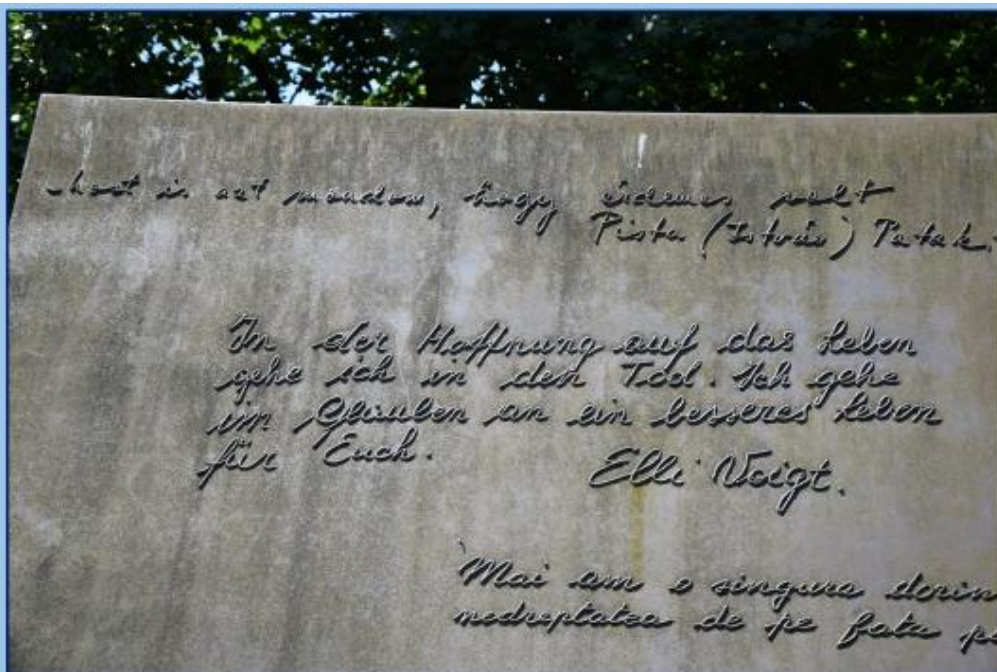
